# **Spotlight on Patient & Family Advisory Councils**

In fall of 2024, we reconvened Patient & Family Advisory Councils at our MDFP and FMI clinics. In years past, we had similar councils to help us solicit feedback and provide education to a group of our patients, and the ACGME now requires that we have an advisory committee at each family medicine practice at which residents are based. We have been fortunate to engage 6-8 patients at each site, and each council meets in person four times a year. To date, we have mainly focused on educating our patient leaders on the residency program, including our history, medical training offered, patient demographics in our clinics, recruitment processes, and the life of the family medicine resident over their three years at MDFMR. We are proactively sharing data on patient experience and quality improvement with the hope of gaining crucial feedback from them to help us improve in all areas of patient care. Over time, we will find new ways to engage the committees to help us in many aspects of our clinical care and educational efforts. ## **MGMC Medical Staff Elections**

MDFMR will be well represented on MaineGeneral's Medical Executive Committee come January. ONMM & FM faculty John Diefenderfer DO was elected to a two-year term as physician at-large. In this role he will sit on the MaineGeneral Health Board of Directors in addition to participating in monthly Medical Executive Committee meetings. MDFMR alum (class of 2010) Deirdre Heersink DO was elected to the two-year position of president of the medical staff, while alum (class of 2013) Jason Brown MD was elected to serve as vice president which is a president elect position, with 2 years as VP followed by 2 years as president.

# **Lead Screening for Maine Children**

With MaineGeneral's support, MDFMR partnered with the Maine CDC Childhood Lead Poisoning Prevention Program on a pilot to utilize LeadCare II blood lead analyzers at MDFP and FMI. The goal of having access to these instruments is to increase timely identification, reporting, and management of elevated lead blood levels in Maine's pediatric population. At the end of the project, there will be an evaluation of the impact of point-of-care blood lead testing on testing rates and identification of lead poisoning in children, particularly among those on MaineCare.

#### **New! MDFMR Bulletin Board Channel in Teams**

A new Teams channel, "MDFMR Bulletin Board," has been created, and everyone has access to view and edit. It contains a calendar section where everyone can share community events & activities, as well as a "posts" section that functions as a community bulletin board.
