#### Ironman 70.3 Maine



The 4<sup>th</sup> consecutive Ironman 70.3 Maine in Augusta took place July 27. Over 60 volunteers from MDFMR and MaineGeneral provided medical services for the race under the guidance of event medical director Dr.

#### **Advocacy in Action**

A resolution crafted by the Maine Osteopathic Association to prevent criminal prosecution of medical decision-making was submitted to the American Osteopathic Association and adopted thanks to the efforts of alum & current faculty John Diefenderfer DO, alum Bre Glynn DO, and others. The resolution represents the AOA's commitment to ensure that issues of medical decision-making are adjudicated by licensure boards / entities with medical expertise, and to create a public statement supporting the decision-making systems already in place. John Diefenderfer reminds everyone that "in this environment, it's more important than ever that we as physicians come together; not only to care for patients, but to advocate for the kind of healthcare system we believe in. I would encourage us all to become more involved in our state medical societies or specialty colleges; beyond advocacy, these organizations provide community, connection, and the chance to influence how medicine is practiced. For all of us, especially those feeling isolated or burned out, joining these organizations is a way to regain agency, engage with purpose, and help shape the future of medicine."

#### **Honduras May 2025 Recap**

A team of 22 healthcare professionals, including 8 from MDFMR, provided care for 350 patients along the

border of Honduras & El Salvador. It was moving to reconnect with friends,



colleagues, and patients, especially given current economic and immigration challenges. From a central location in Colomancagua, the team traveled daily to outlying villages, averaging 100 patients per day. 127 children, 159 adults, and 64 older adults were seen. 288 patients had medical visits, 26 had pelvic exams, 84 received OMT, 4 joints were injected, 1 contraceptive implant was removed, and a new diagnosis of diabetes was made. There were 172 dental visits overall. These trips, occurring since 2015, could not happen without support from many people and especially Dr. Julia McDonald's leadership and commitment — thank you!
